


Lawrence McManus On Friday, December 31, 2021, Lawrence McManus passed away at the age of 84 after six weeks in hospice care. Larry was born in New York City to Lawrence (Sr.) and Marie McManus. He lived in Japan for two years while his father was serving as an appointed defense attorney during the World War II Tokyo war crimes tribunal. Upon graduating from St. Peter's Catholic High School, he attended and received a Bachelor of Science degree in Mathematics from Manhattan College. Prior to 1960, Larry moved to El Paso and worked at White Sands Missile Range for more than 30 years until retirement. Working at White Sands Missile Range allowed him to serve his military commitment to the U.S. Army. He married Julie in 1964 and raised four children. Larry had a passion for sports, playing card games, and watching movies. Early on in El Paso he played golf regularly and participated in many tournaments and Sunday scrambles at Ascarate Golf Course. He was heavily involved in youth baseball and football while his children were playing sports including being the head coach for Mesita Boys Baseball teams and assisting with the Junior Miners youth football teams during the 1970's and early 1980's. He held season tickets for UTEP football and basketball from the 1960s through the 1980s. Larry was an expert bridge player and regularly played American Contract Bridge at the El Paso Bridge Club from the 1980s through the 2000's. He also enjoyed playing regular games of poker, Michigan, pinochle, and cribbage with friends and family. Larry had an affinity for movies of all genres and could easily answer any movie trivia question. He had a great sense of humor and loved to share jokes with friends and family. Larry was preceded in death by his father, Lawrence, mother, Marie, brother, Jerry, and second wife, Lillian. He was the last of his generation of the New York City McManus family, following the passing of his second cousin Jim McManus, the patriarch of the McManus Midtown Democratic Club which ruled politics in the Hell's Kitchen area of New York from 1892 through 2017. He is survived by his four children, Larry (Laura), Regina (Albert), Marc (Daisy), Mike, his nieces Kathy (Gene), Eileen (Steve), four grandchildren (Marcos, Alex, Christian, and Brooklynne), and one great grandchild (Apollo). 
Dr. Ben-Zion Taber March 17, 1927 - December 25, 2021 Ben-Zion Taber, age 94, died at his home in El Paso on Saturday, Dec. 25, 2021. He is survived by his wife, Ruth Migdal Taber and his wonderful children and grandchildren: Joan (Keni Lorber) daughters Sarah and Miriam, Susan (Lee Weisz) and Dave (Laura Moll) sons Evan and Jeremy. He was born in Providence, R.I. and enlisted in the Navy when he turned 17. After service he returned to Brown University for his undergraduate degree and received his medical degree from Harvard Medical School in 1952. He was Board Certified and a Fellow in the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology and practiced Obstetrics and Gynecology in El Paso from 1958-1963. The family then moved to the east coast where Dr. Taber served as an expert on the newly discovered oral contraceptives for the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA). The family moved again – to Palo Alto, California –where he accepted a position as Medical Director and Vice President of Syntex Corp. Ten years later he was appointed Clinical Associate Professor of OB/GYN at Stanford University Medical School and became the director of the Santa Clara Valley Medical Center Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology. In the 1980's he practiced OB/GYN privately in Los Gatos, CA. Dr. Taber was a prolific writer. He authored the classic "Manual of Gynecologic and Obstetrical Emergencies" – published by Saunders - in English, Spanish, Italian and Japanese editions. He also wrote "Proving New Drugs" (1969) based on his experience in the FDA which explained the long tedious process involved before new drugs could be safely released for use by the public. In addition to many scientific papers in medical journals, his second love - travel - resulted in numerous articles about medical history around the world. Dr. Taber and his wife, Ruth retired to El Paso in 1990. He said it was the best move he ever made! Graveside Service will be held on Thursday, December 30, 2021, at 2:30 PM at Ft. Marie Anne "Texas" Logan Obituary: Marie Anne Logan El Paso -Marie Anne "Texas" Logan, loving wife and mother, passed away peacefully at home in El Paso, Texas from Alzheimer's disease at the age of 86 on December 6, 2021. Marie was born in Malines, Belgium in 1935 to Armand and

Josephine De Smidt. She lived through the blitzkrieg of Belgium in 1940, and at the age of 7, was captured along with her mother and held in Montluc Prison in German-occupied France. While awaiting transport to Auschwitz, she and her mother escaped and made their way to Switzerland. In Switzerland, they were first aided by the Red Cross, and then a family friend until the end of the war. They were subsequently reunited in Belgium with her father, a Belgian artillery officer, who later attained the rank of three-star general. Marie met her true love and future husband, Robert "BJ" Logan, while attending college in Paris. He was stationed at NATO with the U.S. Air Force. One of the courtship stories Marie told was that her father, who was also stationed at NATO, decided he would need to have this American interloper investigated before there would be any marriage. After a thorough review, the General was unable to find any fault with BJ or his family, and so Marie and BJ were married in Fontainebleau, France, where they later had two daughters. After the family moved to the states, Marie intermittently pursued various avocations including newspaper advertising, real estate, and interior decorating. Marie never met a stranger and loved maintaining a beautiful home and cooking wonderful meals for her family and friends. Not one to stay idle, Marie engaged in many hobbies throughout her life, including taking up tennis in her 40s. Being quite competitive, she attained the No. 1 tennis ranking in the state in the 45-and-over bracket. She was also proud to have attained her Gold Life Master in bridge. Other hobbies she conquered with full force included tole painting, Scrabble, cross-stitching, and knitting. Her competitiveness was also wrought upon her children, whom she lovingly embarrassed by being vocally supportive of them at their various childhood competitions. Also, she would come home after a full workday and prepare a full course family meal not TV dinners. Like I said, she was a "whirling dervish". I'm sure we all have missed her candied carrots that she prepared for potlucks. Besides all that, she was a seamstress making her children's clothes and even her husband's suits!

Rose got up many mornings at 4:00 or 5:00 a.m. to help each of her kids with their respective paper delivery routes. As the saying goes "spare the rod and spoil the child." Rose had no spoiled children. I laughed then as I laugh now as I recall when Bob was being interviewed for lawschool he was asked what kind of support he could expect from his parents. His answer, "My parents give me moral support."

I could go on because I like remembering Rose even though it brings me to tears. But this one thing I know: Rose gets an A++ for a life well lived. Abba Father greeted her, "Well done my good and faithful servant," said the Master. "You have been faithful in managing small amounts I will put you in charge of large amounts.
