



She passed away peacefully on November 12, 2022, after a brief illness. Nancy attended El Paso High School and Texas Western College of Mines, now UTEP, where she achieved several awards and state-wide notoriety as an actress. She was encouraged to move to NY and try out for Broadway but decided not to pursue that path. She loved being a teacher and always enjoyed her chance encounters with former students. She was introduced to the game of duplicate bridge by her first husband, Edward V. Ryan. She soon achieved the coveted Life Master status and was often sought out for partnerships. In 1968 she married the love of her life, Robert J. Lealos. She gave up her teaching career and the two blended their families and built a very successful business together after his retirement from the military. Bob soon learned the game of bridge and they made several very close friends at the El Paso Bridge Club, as she improved her standing to Sapphire Life Master in the ACBL. In addition to bridge, Nancy was passionate about her growing family, animals, reading, British TV mysteries, crossword puzzles, going out to eat, and living El Paso. Nancy was preceded in death by her parents, her brother Edward T. Jennings, both of her husbands, and two of her stepchildren, Robert J. Lealos Jr. and Patti S. Lealos, RN. Rex Rease Glimp

JUNE 9, 1928 - NOVEMBER 10, 2022

Rex was born in Burnet, TX, June 9, 1928, to parents Wilton H. Glimp and Jewel Karnes Glimp. He had one sister, Margaret McConnell, and one brother, Boyd B. Glimp. All are now deceased. He was married to Alethea Irene Maib for 44 years. She passed away in 1999.

Rex is survived by one son, Guy Glimp of Colmesneil, TX, and one daughter, Rexanne Evans of El Paso, TX. Also surviving are four granddaughters, Samantha and Renée Evans, Bridget Reynolds, Megan Long, and numerous cousins, nieces, nephews, and great-

grand-children. Rex lived on ranches in Menard and Van Horn, TX (1933 to 1944). While in High School at Menard, Rex played all sports and was a member of the Glee Club and was the sports editor of the school paper. He attended Texas A&M from 1945-1948 where he was a member of the football, track and field teams. He spent the summer of 1947 at Sul Ross University, where he also had a radio program, and was known as "Texas Rex", the singing cowboy. He went to Texas Tech (1948-1950) and graduated with a degree in Animal Husbandry. Shortly after college, Rex spent two years (1951-1952) in the Army (one year at Ft. Sill, OK as a physical training instructor for all recruits on their way to Korea, and one year in Korea as a Military Policeman with the 25th Infantry Division). In 1953, Rex moved to El Paso to start a new career. The family ranch had gone broke due to a long draught in West Texas (1945-1952). He met and married Alethea Irene Maib, January 1, 1954, a beautiful ballet dancer who once danced with the Rockettes in Radio City, N.Y., N.Y. In 1954, he became a life insurance agent with Great American of Dallas, and in 1960, joined Belk Insurance Agency to create a new department that would offer all types of life, health, and retirement products to the 20,000+ customers of the agency. This venture proved to be a huge success, and Rex was made a full partner of the company at the end of the first year. The Belk name was changed many times over the next few years, due to mergers, with the final name being Concord Insurance Agency. During Rex's career in the insurance business, he won many national honors for sales, and was a Chartered Life Underwriter and Life Time Member of the "Million Dollar Roundtable". He served as President of the El Paso Estate Planning Council, and for many other groups and organizations. He retired in 1990 after Concord Insurance Agency was sold. At this time, Rex became interested in the game of Duplicate Bridge. He earned the coveted Gold Life Member award, which is accomplished by years of success competing in tournaments all over the U.S.A. He also started a bridge school in El Paso and taught many local individuals and professional people how to play bridge. In 2016, he was called to Washington, D.C. at the National Convention to receive a special award. He was selected as one of the top eight bridge teachers in the U.S.A. He closed the bridge school in 2019, due to problems from an old back injury, followed by a COVID-19 illness. Rex will long be remembered for his competitive spirit, and his willingness to help and teach others. He will be missed and loved by many. *"I'll not say goodbye but see you later." 


Walter White

Tom Godfrey Hussmann

AUGUST 17, 1933 - NOVEMBER 4, 2022

TOM GODFREY HUSSMANN, age 89, died on November 4, 2022, in El Paso, Texas. He was born at Hotel Dieu Hospital on August 17, 1933, and was the son of Harry L. and Lettie Godfrey Hussmann.

He attended Rusk Elementary School and Austin High School. He was graduated from New Mexico Military Institute in 1951 and received his congressional

appointment to the United States Naval Academy from Texas, graduating with the Class of 1955. He served on the aircraft carrier USS Boxer, minesweeper USS Parrot and an amphibious transport USS Orleans Parish until his resignation in 1959.

He worked in sales as Vice President for Harry L. Hussmann, Jr., Inc. before earning an MBA degree in 1964 from University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School of Business and Finance. He began his career at Southwest National Bank in El Paso. He then organized and was President and CEO of Montwood National Bank from 1973 until 1985. In 1990, Tom was a founding director of WestStar Bank and became a Director Emeritus in 2009.

Tom was active in the community as a two-time President of St. Clement's Episcopal Parish School, Chairman of Del Sol Medical Center hospital, organizer and Treasurer of El Paso Cancer Treatment Center, Chairman of St. Joseph Hospital, President of Coronado Country Club, Trustee and Treasurer of El Paso Community Foundation, Chairman of UTEP College of Health Sciences advisory council and President of the Navy League Council. He was honored as Trustee of the Year and awarded lifetime membership in the El Paso Chamber of Commerce. He was a longtime member of YMCA, Los Caballeros, Rotary Club of El Paso, El Maida Shrine, Fraternity Masonic Lodge 1111 and the Royal Order of Jesters. He also served as Director of the Texas Bankers Association and was a proud long-time member of Coronado Country Club since 1959.

In retirement, Tom was President of Hussmann Ventures, Inc. and Hussmann Group, Ltd., both family real estate investment companies. He enjoyed golf travels with family and friends, his church, weekly poker with his high school chums, literature courses at UTEP Lifelong Learning Center, reading, and pursuing bridge expertise. He taught his grandchildren the fine art of making a perfectly proportioned Scotch and water and how to play poker. He loved to attend any sporting event and firmly believed everyone should experience an Army-Navy game once in their lifetime.





Sam Stoxen, a longtime tournament director, died unexpectedly of an apparent heart attack on Feb. 14. He was 71.


Stoxen grew up in Dickinson ND and attended Dickinson State University where he obtained degrees in math and science. He taught high school

math and physical education in Moore MT for two years. After deciding to leave the education field, Stoxen moved to Gresham OR and obtained a degree in mortuary science. He was a funeral director in Dickinson for several years until he once again went back to school and got a degree in computer science. He moved to Bismarck where he worked at the state capitol in the office of budget and finance until his retirement.

Stoxen learned to play bridge at a young age and pursued this interest throughout his life. He was a director at the Bismarck Bridge Club as well as a national tournament director who oversaw tournaments throughout the Midwest beginning in 1993. He moved to Denver CO where he continued to direct bridge tournaments locally and nationally.

"District 17 lost a true professional with the death of Sam Stoxen the night our Valentine's Day tournament concluded," wrote Robert Esch of El Paso TX. "He came from Denver to help us throw our small tournament with his big smile, his knowledge of movements and his patience.

"We were never rushed or yelled at; he was so polite and never condescending. He even filled in on a team movement and tied for first! What a champion."
